


Dear friends,

For now, do know that both publications and their companion Teacher's Guide (for both grades) are largely based in the family culture of each homeschooler who uses them: this is how it should be. We choose to be homeschoolers because we recognize how important family is and how family can be the basis to ensure that our children, when grown, can go out into the world filled with compassion, purpose and clear thinking. Thus a topic like human physiology, being about some of the most important aspects of parenting such as health and well-being, diet, and human reproduction, needs to be able to honor each family's perspective. And so although I lead you and your child through an exploration of human physiology, to make it real, to root it firmly in the reality of your family ethos, much of the content needs to be supplied by you. Each of you has different perspectives and practices in terms of of health and diet—topics not always covered by human physiology studies in the middle grades. And how your child comes to awareness of human reproduction is a sacred and sensitive topic that will be different for each family.

I did want to say, however, that as I am writing these curriculum materials, how aware I am of how important your choice to homeschool and to use a curriculum like Christopherus really is. I just finished some notes on giving one's child a dictation: I doubt any public school or most homeschooled children get the opportunity to take dictation. And why is dictation important? What archaic skills could possibly be valued in its use? The skills of listening, paying attention, being mindful and not getting lost in one's work, and building a template for one's own good writing: these are the invaluable skills that dictation can develop. At Christopherus, we begin dictation and what I call 'collaborative writing' from about fifth grade. These are vital parts of all areas of our curriculum.
