


Dear friends,

There are many things you can do to delay and soften the inevitable screen use and those things are extremely important. But...there are individuals whose addictive tendencies—and we all have them, just some of us are much more susceptible to their influence—ensure that they become dominated by their screens.

What to do? Prayer is one powerful option. We are not alone in this world and the dark spiritual forces which thrive in the addictive realms of life can be overcome by the spiritual sustenance we can receive from prayer. In about a week you can order the Seventh Grade Curriculum (we're just waiting for the proof to return to us from Lulu). This curriculum is much smaller than those of earlier grades mainly because language arts, astronomy, chemistry, history and (late winter) human physiology are all sold separately.

We sell 7^{th} and 8^{th} gr publications in this way because homeschooling children of this age is not at all like homeschooling younger children: there are so many variations in how one approaches not just how one teaches, but what one teaches. Any set curriculum is bound to miss as much as it may hit the developmental needs and reality of 13 and 14 year olds. And by these grades, all Waldorf schools have specialty teachers who take up subjects that are beyond what the class teacher can manage. We encourage you to do the same and so for some subjects, us providing guidance is more appropriate than lessons.

Seventh grade chemistry is chugging along nicely and it will be available in a month

or two. It is focused on fire, water, air and earth, the objective foundations of all further chemistry explorations which, critically for 13 year olds, can be experienced with their senses and are easily seen to be a part of life, whether in the compost heap, the photosynthesis of plants or the action of oxidation in leaves or on metals. Chemistry is usually taught in conventional education by examining the abstractions of atoms and chemical formulae and is generally based in test tubes, not in living systems and beings. In eighth grade the students will take significant steps in that direction, but not yet. If we want to raise the next generation to have real connections and care for the living world, then we need to help them always feel the reality of those connections as we teach, grounded in life around us.

Therefore soil and water testing, photosynthesis, the oxygen/nitrogen cycle, the observation of the three states of water, of how things burn and other practical hands-on lessons will fill the three weeks dedicated in the year's schedule (see Seventh Grade Curriculum for schedules).



can instruct your child. There is also a lengthy PDF of experiments and demonstrations so you can plan your lessons accordingly. Some background information is provided by links to other sources—some of the experiments can also be found there.


The main thrust of Christopherus chemistry is to help your child be as accurate,

precise and clear as possible when describing what he observes. He will be asked to verbally describe phenomena as well as write short reports and sketch what he sees. He must not be disturbed by family activities and noise while this is happening. As I say over and over again in various seventh grade publications, by this stage of homeschooling, you must be prepared to hold some lessons in the evening or at other times when other siblings are occupied or asleep. There is just no getting around that. Homeschooling children of this age means that one must expand into weekends and evenings, both because of the increased workload but also so that the wonderful bustle of family life does not intrude on those studies which must be done in peace. Therefore, a three week main lesson might, for some of you, become an evening or two a week for many weeks. This is not ideal, but when one homeschools, one has to do what one has to do!

Human physiology is the last part of seventh grade for me to complete—I hope to

finish it by late winter 2024/25. At that point, the Christopherus seventh grade

curriculum will be complete and I will turn my attention to 8th grade!



planning to do for high school. Most of our 8th grade materials will be focused on choices and different possibilities.
